A blog on our Halifax to London walk for Every Child Leaving Care Matters.

On the 24th September WE set off on our #Halifax2London walk on behalf of ResCareTo21 and the Children and young people we work for.

The campaign started because the voices of the young people were listened to and heard loud and clearly by some, if not all. This is what all the team are conscious of and it is at the forefront of our minds, hearts and work.

On the first few days of walking it became apparent and clear to our team that something was happening. I couldn't put my finger on it until after the presentations at Manchester Metropolitan University and Hope University and walked and talked with good people like Donna Peach (Dr). What, in fact, was happening was that we were all uniting and agreeing to move forward together as one, somehow the walk provided a focus. We didn't need them to campaign we needed everyone to get behind us and move forward together, united as one, to make the greatest impact we can. She gave me real hope for the future of the campaign and politics in general. I'm sure she will inspire many new people to vote. A real person with real life experiences with a heart and common sense.

Over the next week I met Jon Dudley, Angie Naylor and my good friend Sharon. It was an honour to walk and learn so much from these people but most of all have them supporting our campaign. Jon even spent his Birthday walking with me - what a guy!

There was a foster parent there who came after having a tough couple of nights. Thank you. You are a special person! And Marion! Amazing lady who I had the pleasure of meeting and Luke who always impresses me how much time he gives to help things improve. Top man.
